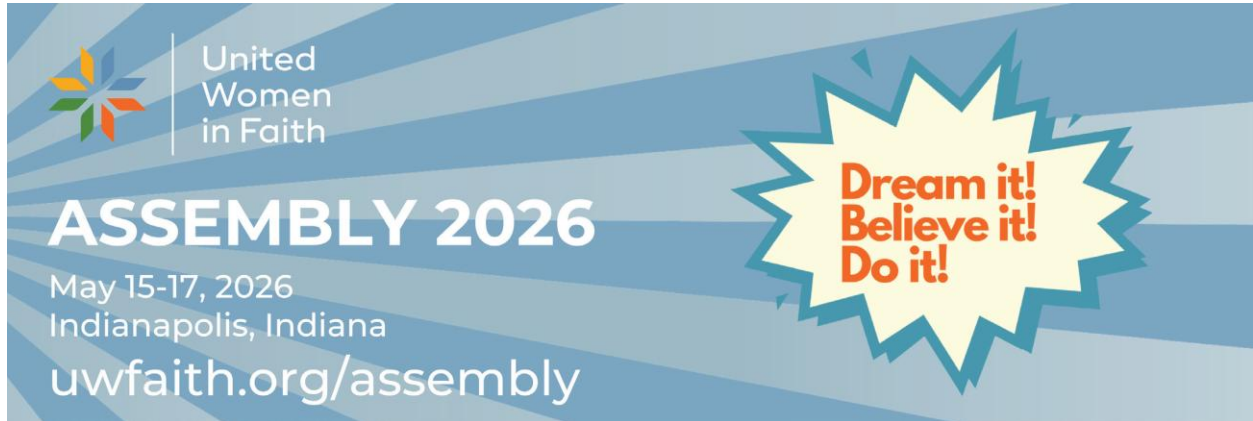

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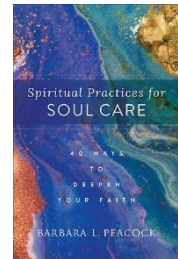
Our Northern Colorado District Soul Care Day was a success.

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Spring is often the time for cleaning out old stuff. The position of Secretary is in part keeper of the records. Often times, she receives boxes and boxes of papers. The retention recommendation of the national office is to retain records such as minutes and attachments for two quadrennium. They are also recommending that records can be kept electronically and perhaps a set can be on a USB drive and kept in a secure location.

It may be an initial tedious task to sort through the records and cull out those no longer needed. There is often a feeling that we will be discarding something we will need in the future. But when I moved back to Boulder after living in New York for fourteen years while packing, I found stuff at the back of my closet I had not even unpacked in all my time there!

My unit, First United Methodist of Boulder, did a quick overview of the Mission Study of Practicing Hope. This is a very timely study and showed that we always need hope. It is even more crucial to exhibit hope to our young people for the message that they are



getting elsewhere is not one of hope, but cynicism and avoidance of accountability. At a recent national United Women in Faith webinar on resistance, the leader said to “always leave room for hope!”

I read this right after working on the district’s proposed 2026 budget worksheet. I thought, “Hmm, I sure hope this proposed Pledge to Mission is realistic for our new district configuration. There are so many women and children whose lives will be improved when (if?) we meet this pledge. They’re counting on us.”

2026 seems like a long ways off, but it is time for all of us to be considering our personal and unit pledges to mission. If we plan for it, I’m thinking our pledges could be 5% more than our 2025 pledges. Or even \$5 per person more would help. And yes, I know that inflation and tariffs are taking more of our personal budgets than we’d probably like. Our mission institutions and the women and children they serve are experiencing the same dilemma. My great hope is that we personally and collectively rise to the occasion and increase our pledges to alleviate the suffering that others are experiencing.

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## *Say “Yes!” to Something New*

I receive emails from the Silver Sneakers group on a regular basis. I’m borrowing from an article that spoke to me, especially because of our SOUL Care retreat on May 31. The article was urging readers to say “Yes!” to trying something new, to step out of your comfort zone, and to change your world—even just a little bit. I think that speaks to what we need to do, not only physically, but spiritually.

*Experiment*—try a new restaurant or cuisine, take a different exercise class, or sign up for sewing or needlework lessons, meet a new neighbor, plant something new in your garden. According to Susan Krauss Whitbourne, Professor Emerita at the University of Massachusetts Amherst, “it can be very healthy and mind-stretching to try something new.”

Some creative options for experimenting include trying a photography, watercolor, or pottery class. Maybe knit a prayer shawl or prayer squares for your friends in need of a little comfort. Join the chancel or handbell choir. Dance with joy with only God watching!

Say *Yes!* to your community—visit neighbors, join in a block party, visit locally-owned restaurants and stores, say hello as you pass someone on the sidewalk.

*Volunteer* in your community—choose a cause close to your heart—children, education, the local library, animals, or helping neighbors with no fixed address. Run an errand for a friend, or bake cookies for someone who needs a ‘pick me up.’ Put the volunteer activity on your calendar and make a date with yourself.

*Exercise*—start with a 15-minute walk around your neighborhood and expand to a new class at the recreation center.

*Celebrate*—find a silly day to celebrate, like National Siblings Day, or National Bubble Bath Day, or National Trivia Day. Find a reason to celebrate and honor friends and family, and yourself.

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## Social Justice & Action

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## Membership Nurture & Outreach

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It just occurred to me that we are almost halfway through 2025! We've had a great start in our local church this year, with excellent programs and good fellowship. We've put out invitations in our church bulletins about programs that would appeal to more than just United Women in Faith---and have had had some new people join us. I would love to hear what you are doing in your Units!

As I was pondering what to write for this newsletter, what came to mind was that familiar scripture from John 21: 1-17. Jesus asks Simon, "Do you love me? And when Simon responds, "Yes!", Jesus says, "Feed my lambs." Jesus asks again, "Simon, do you love me?" And, of course, Simon responds "Yes, Lord!" And then Jesus says, "Take care of my sheep." And then (we know) that Jesus asks a third time, "Simon, do you love me?" Simon is sad by this point and assures Jesus that he loves him....so Jesus responds by saying, "Feed my sheep."

So, what can that mean for us, relating to Membership Nurture and Outreach? Do we love Jesus? Are we feeding the lambs? (The new people among us, the young ones...) Are we taking care of his sheep?" (Those who've been around for a while---- maybe some elderly sheep. And then again, "Feed my sheep." How are we doing that? Are we offering excellent programming? Good fellowship? Opportunities for witness and outreach in the community and beyond? Are we "Feeding those sheep" through our programming, our local outreach, and our giving?

Two of my unit's United Methodist Women have organized what they call the "Golden Circle," made up of women who are no longer able to attend meetings. They've organized callers, and writing of little notes to them each month. This to me is one way that we "take care of our sheep."

Our Membership Nurture and Outreach Coordinator is planning how to organize a circle that meets during one of our church service times. Child care is offered during both services, so that concern is covered---and this might be a good time for working women to be able to get involved. Could this be a way of "feeding our lambs?"

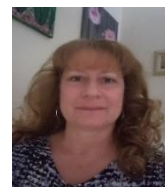

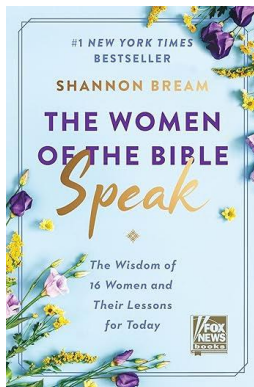

### **The Women of the Bible Speak: The Wisdom of 16 Women and Their Lessons for Today**

People unfamiliar with Scripture often assume that women play a small, secondary role in the Bible. But in fact, they were central figures in numerous Biblical tales. It was Queen Esther's bravery at a vital point in history which saved her entire people. The Bible contains warriors like Jael, judges like Deborah, and prophets like Miriam. The first person to witness Jesus' resurrection was Mary Magdalene, who promptly became the first Christian evangelist, eager to share the news which would change the world forever.

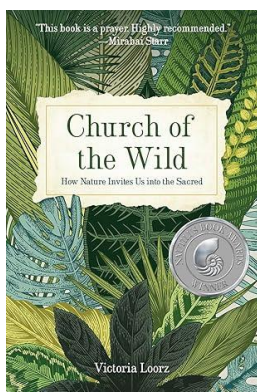
In *The Women of the Bible Speak*, Fox News Channel's Shannon Bream opens up the lives of sixteen of these Biblical women, arranging them into pairs and contrasting their journeys. In pairing their stories, Shannon helps us reflect not only on the meaning of each individual's life, but on how they relate to each other and to us.

In broadening each woman's individual story, Shannon offers us a deeper understanding of each, and wisdom and insights that can transform our own lives today.

## **Church of the Wild: How Nature Invites Us into the Sacred**

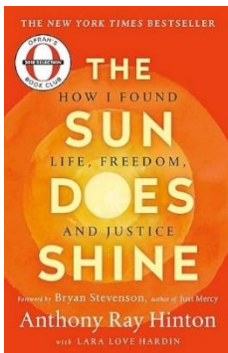

Whether disillusioned by the dominant church or unfulfilled by traditional expressions of faith, many of us long for a deeper spirituality. Victoria Loorz certainly did. Coping with an unraveling vocation, identity, and planet, Loorz turned to the wanderings of spiritual leaders and the sanctuary of the natural world, eventually cofounding the Wild Church Network and Seminary of the Wild.

With an ecospiritual lens on biblical narratives and a fresh look at a community larger than our own species, *Church of the Wild* uncovers the wild roots of faith and helps us deepen our commitment to a suffering earth by falling in love with it--and calling it church. Through mystical encounters with wild deer, whispers from a scrubby oak tree, wordless conversation with a cougar, and more, Loorz helps us connect to a love that literally holds the world together--a love that calls us into communion with all creatures.

### **The Sun Does Shine**

In 1985, Anthony Ray Hinton was arrested and charged with two counts of capital murder in Alabama. Stunned, confused, and only twenty-nine years old, Hinton knew that it was a case of mistaken identity and believed that the truth would prove his

innocence and ultimately set him free.

But with no money and a different system of justice for a poor black man in the South, Hinton was sentenced to death by electrocution. He spent his first three years on Death Row at Holman State Prison in agonizing silence—full of despair and anger toward all those who had sent an innocent man to his death. But as Hinton realized and accepted his fate, he resolved not only to survive, but find a way to live on Death Row. For the next twenty-seven years he was a beacon—transforming not only his own spirit, but those of his fellow inmates, fifty-

four of whom were executed mere feet from his cell. With the help of civil rights attorney and bestselling author of *Just Mercy*, Bryan Stevenson, Hinton won his release in 2015.

With a foreword by Stevenson, *The Sun Does Shine* is an extraordinary testament to the power of hope sustained through the darkest times. Destined to be a classic memoir of wrongful imprisonment and freedom won, Hinton's memoir tells his dramatic thirty-year journey and shows how you can take away a man's freedom, but you can't take away his imagination, humor, or joy.

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# Book Review

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## *So, Who Was Pauli Murray?*

Have you looked at the quarters you have received in change lately? Be sure to look for one (or more) with the word HOPE on the back side. Peer closely, and you will see the face and glasses of Rev. Pauli Murray looking out at you. But---who was Pauli Murray? According to the US Mint, she was one of the most important social justice advocates of the 20th century and famous enough to be included in this new quarter series honoring women.

Because of the UW Faith Reading Program book, *Pauli Murray: the Life of a Pioneering Feminist and Civil Rights Activist*, and the documentary, "My Name is Pauli Murray," I discovered a very special person. Ms. Murray contributed to US history, and served as a role model for women and girls. *Sojourner's* magazine reported that the current administration directed the US Park Service to remove information from its webpage about Murray; her childhood home has been declared a National Historic Landmark in Durham, NC. How could this petite person—black, female, LGBTQ, and so incredibly smart—poses a threat forty years after her death?

I presented a program about Pauli Murray to our unit's Wesley Annes circle and have a summary of her life available. If you would be interested in 'spreading the word' about Murray, please let me know and I can email you a copy.

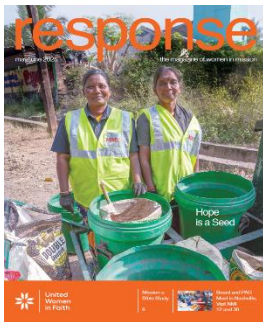

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# UMC Churches in The Northern Colorado District

In 2024 the Mountain Sky Conference of the United Women in Faith (UWFaith) voted to set district boundaries different than those district boundaries that the general church conference uses. The main reason for this difference was to have smaller districts to enhance the ability of UWFaith units to meet and work together more easily.

The following list is of the churches within the boundaries of our new UWFaith Northern Colorado District. Not all of them have active UWFaith units. The ones with stars do have active units.

*The parentheses give the general church district in which that local church resides. There are 2: the Colorado Front Range District (CFR) and the Eastern/Southern Colorado District (ESC).*
